CHRISTMAS SHOEBOXES



Amazingly we have already filled 110 shoeboxes with toiletries, knitted items, sweets, stationery and toys. We hope to fill another 20 boxes to use the items so generously donated.

As always, one can visualise the children opening their gifts in a decorated shoebox – something that we might consider ordinary, but to those children the contents will bring great joy. It must be a wonderful sight to see their faces and hear their delight.

We have some funds left from last year but would be grateful for any donation towards the transportation costs. We are asked to provide \pounds 3 per box. Please pass any gifts to Pat Goodall or Sue Stokes.

On <u>November 11th</u> shoeboxes from around the circuit will be brought to Buckley for the Shoebox Service. Blythswood will collect all the shoeboxes on Monday 13th November to start their long journey across Europe, with many being delivered to children in Ukraine.

On occasions like this we realise just how much help is needed along the way:

- collecting and covering the shoeboxes;
- sourcing the soaps, flannels, toothbrushes and toothpaste, combs and hair accessories for girls, then packing them into toilet bags;
- getting pencils, crayons, biros, felt pens, rubbers, rulers, writing and drawing paper and putting them into pencil cases;
- knitting hats, scarves and mittens suitable for boys and girls of different ages;
- finding soft toys, cars, balls and other toys;
- getting lots and lots of sweets.
