# Readings: Proverbs 22:1-2, 8-9, 22-23

A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, and favour is better than silver or gold.

<sup>8</sup>Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of anger will fail.

<sup>23</sup> for the Lord pleads their cause and despoils of life those who despoil them.

# James 2:1-10, 14-17 - Warning against Partiality

**2** My brothers and sisters,[<sup>a</sup>] do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ?[<sup>b</sup>] **2** For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, **3** and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet,"[<sup>c</sup>] **4** have you not made distinctions among

yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? **5** Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters.[<sup>d</sup>] Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? **6** But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? **7** Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you?

**8** You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." **9** But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. **10** For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it.

### Faith without Works Is Dead

**14** What good is it, my brothers and sisters,[<sup>a</sup>] if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? **15** If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, **16** and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? **17** So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

## Mark 7:24-37 - The Syrophoenician Woman's Faith

**24** From there he set out and went away to the region of Tyre.<sup>[a]</sup> He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, **25** but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. **26** Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. **27** He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." **28** But she answered him, "Sir,<sup>[b]</sup> even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." **29** Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." **30** So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

#### Jesus Cures a Deaf Man

**31** Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. **32** They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. **33** He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. **34** Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." **35** And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. **36** Then Jesus[<sup>c</sup>] ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. **37** They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."
